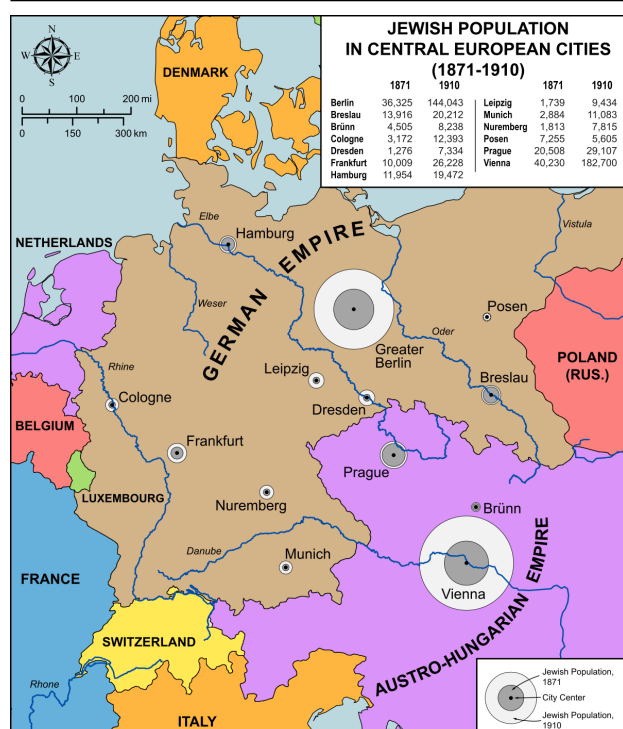


# Jewish Population in Central European Cities (1871–1910)

## Abstract

The proportion of Jews in Germany’s largest cities was much higher than the Reich average. This map demonstrates the substantial growth in that proportion between 1871 and 1910—growth that alarmed Germany’s antisemites.
