

Albrecht Dürer, Four Naked Women /The Four Witches (1497)

Abstract

Albrecht Dürer's engraving, *The Four Witches* (1497), reveals several themes prevalent in early modern images of the witch. The devil peeks out from around a corner, demonstrating the satanic influence underlying what might otherwise be an innocent gathering of young women. Their nudity reinforces the threat of female sexuality and beauty as a conduit for the devil's work. Finally, the witches' serious expressions and the O.G.H (*O Gott hüte*/Oh God save us) indicate the sinister threat of the gathering.
