

“Feminat”: All Female Leadership of the Green Party Parliamentary Group (1984)

Abstract

Following the 1983 national election in West Germany, the Green Party entered the federal parliament for the first time. The party was rooted in the new social movements of environmentalism, feminism, and pacifism. An internal women's quota assured that at least fifty percent of the seats in parliamentary elections would be filled by women. Particularly noteworthy at the time was the all-female leadership of the parliamentary group of the Greens in 1984, the so-called Feminat, led by Antje Vollmer as speaker. The women's quota was new to West Germany at the time but subsequently was taken up by most of the other political parties.
