

Henry Kissinger and Helmut Schmidt (March 8, 1975)

Abstract

A practitioner of *Realpolitik*, the German-born American politician Henry Kissinger played a decisive role in shaping U.S. foreign policy in the 1970s. He did this first as a national security advisor (starting in 1969) and then as the Secretary of State (1973–77). During this period, he worked closely with Chancellor Helmut Schmidt and played a major role in negotiating the Final Act of the Conference for Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE) in Helsinki in 1975. Here, Schmidt (right) welcomes Kissinger to Bonn.
